The college campus will not be open for College Now students in the spring semester, so we have scheduled our Lehman College Now program to be fully online for spring 2022. All courses will be taught through distance learning platforms (i.e. Blackboard, Zoom). Students must complete an online application by December 31, 2021. Students will be notified by email in January 2022 with the information on spring course acceptance and virtual orientation information. Students are reminded to check their email on a regular basis and SPAM/JUNK folders for emails from college.now@lehman.cuny.edu. Classes meet virtually on the schedule listed below and begin on Saturday February 5, Monday February 7 or Tuesday February 8.

Eligibility Requirements:

- 1) Student must be a NYC Public HS student in 10th, 11th or 12th grade.
- 2) Student must have an overall HS average of 80+ and 80+ average in English and 80+ average in Social Studies. (See additional prerequisites for some courses below)
- 3) 10th graders are <u>only</u> eligible for FYS 11: First Year Seminar (1 credit See separate application) or MAT 126: Quantitative Reasoning (3 credits).

BBA 204: Principles of Business Management (Saturday: 10:00 am – 12:40 pm, 3 credits) This course introduces students to basic management concepts involving the theory and practice of attainment of organizational goals through planning, organizing, leading and controlling organizational resources.

CIS 211: Computer Information Systems (T/Th: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 4 credits) This course is an introduction to fundamentals of information systems from a business perspective. It includes computer hardware and software, use of business productivity tools and Internet.

ENG 111: English Composition I (M/W or T/Th: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) English composition course that focuses on paragraph and essay development, summary and critical response to short texts.

ENG 121: English Composition II (M/W: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) Continues the work of ENG 111 advancing critical reading skills and essay development. Emphasis on writing analytical essays and papers based on research in various academic disciplines. (*Prerequisite: Students must successfully complete ENG 111 to register for ENG 121.*)

ENW 210: Introduction to Creative Writing (M/W: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) This course focuses on the reading, writing and analysis of fiction, poetry and dramatic literature with the intent of developing students' creative voices in these forms of creative writing. (*Prerequisite: Students must successfully complete ENG 111 or receive approval from College Now program*)

LTS 242: Latinos in the United States (T/Th: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) This course seeks to contextualize the experiences and trajectory of Latino/as in the United States. This course will examine how a heterogeneous and changing Latino/a population shapes life in the United States and how the United States shapes and molds the Latina/o community. Students will learn to recognize and appreciate the complexities of the Latino/a experiences in the United States and will become familiar with a critical vocabulary to facilitate complex discussions about broader issues of American culture and identity.

MAT 126: Quantitative Reasoning (M/W: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) Survey of modern quantitative techniques in a variety of disciplines. Critical thinking and mathematical/quantitative literacy are emphasized. (*Eligibility: Students must have 80+ HS average and 80+ average in Algebra I.*)

MAT 132: Introduction to Statistics (M/W: 4:10 – 5:50 pm or T/Th: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 4 credits) Collection, plotting, and comparison of data sets, histograms, descriptive statistics, the frequency definition of probability, random experiments, random sampling, binomial and normal variables, confidence intervals. (Eligibility: Students must have 80 + HS average and 80+ Math average and 70+ on CC Math Regents exam or receive approval from College Now program.)

MAT 172: Precalculus (T/Th: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 4 credits) Students must have 85+ HS mathematics average AND 70+ on CC Math Regents exam AND 80+ average in Algebra II/Trigonometry Regents course. (*Placement exam required: Students will be provided information on placement exam after submitting application.*)

PHI 171: Introduction to Philosophy (M/W: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) This course will survey the main areas of philosophical thought and the major questions they raise. These include Epistemology (What can be known?), Metaphysics (What exists and how?), Philosophy of Religion (Does God exist?), and Ethics (What is the right way to live?).

PHI 173: Justice and Society (T/Th: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) This course introduces the student to some of the fundamental concepts of social and political philosophy. Political philosophy enquires into the meaning of political concepts through the critical appraisal of the theory and nature of government. The course investigates concepts such as justice, liberty, equality and political/moral obligation.

PSY 166: General Psychology (M/W: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) Introduction to the fundamental concepts and methods of modern psychology. (Prerequisite: Students must successfully complete ENG 111 or receive approval from College Now program.)

SOC 166: Fundamentals of Sociology (T/Th: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) Sociology, the scientific study of human behavior, studies the processes and patterns of social interaction, forms of social organization, and the influence of social structure, groups and institutions upon human behavior. (Prerequisite: Students must successfully complete ENG 111 or receive approval from College Now program.)

SOC 230: Criminology (T/Th: 5:00 – 6:45 pm, 3 credits) The nature and significance of crime as a social phenomenon. Study of the sociological factors that contribute to and maintain the criminal institutional structure and the justice system in the United States. (*Prerequisite: Students must successfully complete ENG 111 or receive approval from College Now program.*)
